

BACKGROUND

- April 4, 2011, Governor Brown signed AB 109 shifting responsibility of:
 - Supervising
 - Housing

Of convicted felons (N3's) and parolees (PSP/PRCS-LA) from the State to County





AB 109 POPULATION TITLES

- PRCS-LA

Post-Released Community Supervision - Los Angeles (CDCR terminology)

- PSP's

Post-released Supervised Person
(LA County Probation Department terminology)

- N3's

Non-Serious, Non-Violent, Non- (High risk) Sex Offender (State Legislation terminology)



STATISTICS

- The State predicted that approximately 170 N3's per week would be sentenced to Los Angeles County. The LA District Attorney's Office cited that approximately 7,000 + N3 felons were sentenced to State Prison terms from LA County.
- As of this date, nearly 3000 N3's have been sentenced to LA County Jails, averaging about 178 per week.



*NOTE: Prior to October 1, 2011, The D.A.'s Office convicted on average 7,000 individuals each year for N3 offences. Averaging 29 convictions per court day.

N3 Statistics

- ➔ N3 in Custody today: **4,124**
- ➔ N3s with Open Charges: **111**
- ➔ N3 Releases to date: **483** (91 females / 392 males)
- ➔ Historical N3 Count (Oct 1st – present): **4,607**
- ➔ I/M serving less than a year: **3,340 (81%)**
- ➔ I/M with sentences of 24 mo + : **115**
- ➔ Highest percentage of convicted N3's: **459PC**
- ➔ Average court sentence (between 1-7 yrs): **2 years**
- ➔ Number of court sentences over 10 years: **14** (highest sentence = 38 years)
- ➔ Leading Conviction Charge: **459PC**



LASD JAIL CAPACITY

Based on estimates, all currently closed and curtailed beds must be re-opened to house the additional inmates. Operational capacity may be reached and/or exceeded by the end of June 2012.

ADDITIONAL RESPONSIBILITY

- **PSP Revocation Hearings:**

Responsibility for conducting these hearings for PSP/PRCS-LA has NOW transferred from the State Board of Parole Hearings (BPH) to the County Court System

- **State Parole Violators:**

Will now serve their time in County Jail (max 180 days)

- **Current Revocation & Probable Causing Hearings:**

Los Angeles County Jail System averages 1,200 CDCR Parolees monthly

- **ALL State Parole Hearings will be transferred to the County Court System in July 2013.**



PRCS-LA'S RELEASED INTO L.A. COUNTY



POST RELEASE COMMUNITY SUPERVISION (PRCS)

The Los Angeles Probation Department was designated by the Board of Supervisors as the **Lead Agency** to:

- Process CDCR Packets
- Conduct Case Management
- Perform Assessment Screening
- Determine Risk Level
- Supervise and Monitor the PSP/ PRCS-LA population



POST RELEASE COMMUNITY SUPERVISION (PCS)

The Los Angeles Sheriff's Department Is responsible for:

- *Assisting Probation with Address Verifications*
- *Conduct "No Show" follow up investigations*
- *Lead the Absconder apprehension efforts (PAL's)*
- *Develop a Network Database*
- *Provide additional Monitoring*
- *Conduct Compliance Checks*

- 13 Professional Staff






ORGANIZATIONAL CHART

Phase I:


- One Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Lieutenant oversees and manages the entire Post-Release Community Supervision Program

L.A. County was divided into five zones




DATA NETWORKING PROGRESS

Commonly Asked Questions

What does it mean by being "Subject to Search"?

Individuals being released on Parole are subject to search by Law Enforcement officials at anytime. This may include vehicular stops, pedestrian stops, in your home, etc.

What do you mean in my home?

The Parole Compliance Team and other law enforcement agencies conduct random parole compliance searches in an attempt to monitor the parolee's reintegration process. This includes conducting searches of your residence for contraband which may violate the terms of your release.

What if I live with a friend or relative?

It is your duty to inform the occupants of the residence in which you reside that you are on parole and both you and the common areas at your residence are subject to search during these inspections. Occupants will be briefly detained pending the parole compliance investigation. *It is imperative you inform other occupants in your residence of this information.*

Can I live in a residence receiving government subsidized assistance?

This depends on the program itself, but for the most part, government assistance programs prohibit any occupants of the home being on active parole or probation. Violation of this can cause termination of the assistance program as well as possible criminal charges.

Where can I get help?

The information listed in this guide has many useful avenues for you the parolee. This information should assist you in your reintegration process and aid you in becoming a productive member of Los Angeles County.




FIELD GUIDE FOR PERSONNEL

STAT CODES

- 810 - To create a **file number** for parole search documentation.
- 811 - Contact with any non-PSP parolee
- 813 - Arrest of a PSP Parolee at Large (PAL) or absconder.
- 814 - Contact of any PSP (similar to stat 811 for a non-PSP parolee)
- 815 - Address verification confirmation for a PSP.

(NOTE—Search of a PSP requires only 814, not 811 or 814)

PENAL CODES

- 1170 P.C. - Definition of a PSP parolee
- 3056 P.C. - Arrest code for non-PSP parole violation
- 3455(a)(4) P.C. - Arrest code for PSP parole violation or warrant
- 3454(c) P.C. - Arrest charge for "Flash Incarceration" (only authorized by a Probation Officer)

PSP LOCATION SEARCH

Parolee - An individual who has a conditional release from imprisonment which entitles the person to serve the remainder of his/her sentence outside of prison, as long as they remain in compliance with the terms of their release. All California Parolees are subject to search and seizure (3067 P.C.).


As in any parolee contact, once their parole status is confirmed, a warrantless search is allowable under the law. In order to conduct a search of a parolee's residence, you shall:

- Perform a location threat assessment (RIB Sheet).
- Consult with L.A. Clearing House.
- Conduct a "Knock and Notice" (844 P.C.)
- Deputies can conduct a "safety sweep" within the rooms and areas outside the scope of the search prior to conducting the parole search.
- The scope of the search will include the parolee's exclusive rooms or areas and any other areas where the parolee has access.
- Persons who reside with the parolee can't expect "privacy" in shared areas of the residence. Therefore, an objection from the co-tenant cannot prevent you from conducting a search of the shared areas.
- All occupants inside the residence may be briefly detained in an effort to identify them and determine if the parolee was in violation of their terms and conditions prohibiting them from consorting with convicted felons.
- A Field/Team Sergeant or above must be present during any search operation. Video documentation shall be conducted for every search operation. The supervisor is not required to be present during the search of the parolee's person or vehicle.
- Pre and Post video shall be taken at the inception and completion of the search operation.

What is Realignment?

Realignment was passed into law by the Governor and became effective on October 1, 2011. It allows some sentenced inmates to remain in the county jails instead of going to prison. It also changed some of the rules for parole.

Who goes to prison and who stays?

If you were convicted of a non-serious, non-violent or non-sex charge and you do not have a prior conviction of a serious or violent felony, or required to register as a sex offender; then you will remain an LA county jail inmate and serve your time here. All others will be sent to state prison to be housed. This decision is determined by the courts during your sentencing. To find out if you will remain in county jail or go to prison, please contact your attorney.

If you are a parole violator, then you will serve your entire violation in the county jail. **PAROLE VIOLATORS WILL NO LONGER GO TO PRISON.** Since you will remain an LA County jail inmate, you will no longer receive gate money upon release.

How many credits do I get now?

Anyone sentenced after October 1, will receive day for day credits. For example, if you receive a 2 year sentence you will only serve 1 year. You will receive credits for your entire time in custody (including pre-sentence time).

Parole violators also receive the same credits as above. For example, if you receive a 180 days revocation (which is now the maximum term) you will serve 90 days. Currently, inmates sentenced under Realignment are **NOT** receiving early releases.

Can I go to a fire camp?

If you have a sentence of 2 or more years, you may be eligible to live and work at a fire camp. The Sheriff's Department will be taking over several camps in the near future. Those eligible will receive 2 days credit for every 1 day served.

This is a voluntary assignment; however, you must be medically cleared and meet the physical requirements of the LA County Fire Department.

QUICK FACTS

- Credits are now day for day (half time).
- No early release for AB109 inmates
- Parole violators no longer go to state prison
- No gate money for parole violators upon release
- You are not a "state" inmate if you remain in the county jail
- You may be eligible for work/school, just like any other inmate
- Fire camp may be an option for those with longer sentences
- No probation term unless ordered by court
