Have we been diligently citing RVs for a significant period of time or have we been turning the other eye? I haven't received any stats on the issue? Any info you can share will be appreciated.

During 2005, parking enforcement responded to or observed over 500 complaints regarding RV's or trailers believed to be in violation of the 72-hour parking ordinance. Here is a summary of the outcome of those complaints and observations that we have records for:

17 - Cited (We were advised not to cite vehicles for this violation about mid-year)
294 - Gone on arrival
124 - Moved prior to enforcement action
48 - Towed



Dear Torrance Community Development,

I'm writing in regard to the discussion of **On-Street Parking of Oversize Vehicles**. My neighbors have a huge RV in their driveway, adjacent to a portable shelter. While these dominate the view from my home, I hesitate to take action. I chose this neighborhood in part because there is NO omnipotent POA enforcing arbitrary rules. Just as our society strives to celebrate personal freedom and cultural diversity, I feel we must learn to tolerate our neighbors. I would urge any legislation on this matter to be written very judiciously, perhaps to address hostile parking tactics but otherwise freely allow parking in front of the owner's home.

The enforcement of existing ordinances and traffic control is more of an issue to me because safety is involved. Many people use my section of Towers Street as a shortcut around the intersection at 190th & Anza. This includes TPD and TFD in addition to soccer moms and high school kids, all of whom we've seen flying past our home more than 20 MPH over the speed limit. At least three pets have been struck by speeding cars in recent years, my wife's parked car was totalled by a hit & run driver, and a neighbor's car was sideswiped. We can no longer park on the street in front of our own homes.

Please provide the Torrance residences who own recreation vehicles the records that were the basis for drawing up the nine items (a thru i) Section 1 of the proposed ordinance.

We want to see all accident records regarding motor homes, etc. (a) interfering with traffic flow, (b) visual obstructions causing accidents, (c) number of bikers injured due to RV's, (d) number of emergency vehicles obstructed, (e) explosions aboard RV's causing injury, (f) number of complaints concerning visual negative aesthetics and sewage spills, (g) run away trailer causing injury, (h) proof why city is not following State codes, (i) at the last meeting we were told that it is against the code to run water, electric and etc. to our RV's thus making it impossible to utilize the State's 72 hour code. I would like to convey my concerns with the RV parking in Torrance. I live in a very nice area in South Torrance on a street with many young children. I have seen quite a few close calls with children almost being hit by cars because there is a huge RV parked on the corner causing a dangerous blind spot for children and vehicles. We have lived in this neighborhood for 5 years and this huge RV has always been parked in the same location. Sometimes moving across the street for a few days when neighbors complain and then back to the same spot. Moving from one side of the street to the other is totally unacceptable. This is not solving the problem and is causing a great deal of frustration with neighbors who are tired of seeing this giant eyesore. To make matters worse, the RV is not parked in front of the owners house, it is parked on a side street blocking the view of a dangerous corner. This shows the lack of consideration this RV owner has for the neighbors.

We have many friends who visit from other cities who question why these RVs are allowed to remain parked on our residential streets. This is not allowed in many other cities and is embarrassing when we hear this from our visitors who comment that our city looks like an RV park on the streets. Such comments make me aware how these RVs impact the value of our property.

Besides being a major safety concern for our neighborhood children and vehicles who cannot see around these parked RVs, it is a lack of consideration to the entire neighborhood. Then we need to address the families that come to visit residences of Torrance? There are no facilities in or near Torrance for these visitors to park. Where do we tell them to go?


Please that these issues into consideration before taking away our rights.

I am a 25+ year resident and home owner in this fine city and have chosen to locate my business in this city as well for over 15 years. Unfortunately due to the boisterous and vocal members of the RV community I find it necessary to write this to you anonymously. My family and I have attended all of the parking meetings as well as the traffic commission meetings on this issue and have spoken our views numerous times. I am NOT in any way ANTI-RV.... The issue here is enforcement! It's that simple plain old LAW ENFORCEMENT! I know this city is a big place and there are more important issues to you but in this fine city the only way for some action on traffic issues is to bombard them with multiple calls before anything gets done!

Traffic seems to feel that the "Current 72 hour law does not give them the tools" to enforce the law properly. Should it be necessary for a Torrance Resident to make a daily phone call week in and week out to the Traffic Department to resolve a situation where someone is breaking the law?

The original traffic meetings discussed a permit system which seems to be a terrific idea, sure it had some issues but those could be resolved over time and would give the Traffic Dept. the "Needed Tools" to enforce these laws.

Since the RV contingent came to the meetings in a vocal and sometimes disruptive manner things seemed to get watered down to this current Grandfathered Permit system. Think about this? Does this really in any way solve our problems? No I think not! and in actuality gives a current RV owner the right to park his or her vehicle in Torrance? What's up with that? Seems like we are now giving the RV owner more rights than a standard vehicle on our streets. So why has an issue of removing large vehicles and trailers gone to giving them a CITY PERMIT?

Let me remind you again the issue in this city is NOT the use of an RV. They should not be banned in our city... BUT THE ISSUE IS THOSE FEW OWNERS WHO DECIDE THEY ARE ABOVE THE LAW AND HAVE A RIGHT TO STORE THESE MONSTERS ON OUR STREETS. This is more than a handful just about every neighborhood has at least one if not multiple offenders. Currently all one has to do is roll his or her trailer or RV a ridiculous matter of a fraction of an inch and they are in accordance with the law. How silly is that!

These owners then play the GAME OF INCHES which allows them to STORE these monsters in the same location for months at a time. These same people feel the slight possibility they might actually get a ticket is a small price to pay since its cheaper to pay a ticket than it is to store them.

I am not going to get into the aesthetics issue, or the reduction in property values due to these vehicles. I am only addressing this because of those who feel it is their right to STORE anything they please on our streets. Thus this applies to ALL VEHICLES, TRAILERS, BOATS ETC. Do you think these items should be stored on our streets for ANY LENGTH OF

TIME!

Where do you feel it is OK to park a 5th wheel which cannot move on its own, and is almost the length of a standard city lot. It is surely not on our streets, these monsters are traffic hazards to all, and for some reason the owners feel it is their devine right to STORE them on our streets along with any detached trailer, boat or RV.

I could go on and on, but will keep my message short. Please..... Review this proposed ordinance and think about it. In my mind it seems like its only a band aid for a huge city problem! This issue is city wide, we have many items such as trailers, boats, and RV's which are stored on our streets and nothing seems to get done about them. May I remind you this is not just a residential issue, in my industrial complex and in other industrial areas of the city these owners are parking and living in these units long term and the CITY CHOOSES TO DO NOTHING!

Accepting this permit system of Grandfathering will only keep this same problem going. The same people will continue to do the same thing they are doing today but WITH A CITY PERMIT. Please adopt a new direction on this ordinance that will give the TRAFFIC DIVISION the tools needed to ENFORCE THE LAW!!! There are to many in our city (some who work for it) that believe that they are ABOVE OUR LAWS! I would like to propose a 24 hour limit on RV's with a loading permit needed for extended loading and unloading, second ban all detached trailers from parking on the street. If for some reason you feel that this Grandfathered permit system is the ONLY system you will accept Please review it for what it is worth and make some changes! I would like to again suggest a ban on detached trailers on city streets that will solve a majority of the problems as well as a penalty for multiple offences such as a revoked permit for multiple parking tickets. Please also raise the parking ticket price for such vehicles and trailers so that it is not cheaper to get a few tickets than it is to store them. These offenders should not be able to park illegally by city permit!

I have enclosed a few images taken in my neighborhood to illustrate this problem. These are items which NEVER MOVE are always in the same place, are parked on lawns, over curbs etc. These are all a nuisance to our fine city!

Please if you have some free time drive our streets and see the problem for yourselves.

I respect you will consider my proposal with time and thought!

No Room, With No View

Where should neighbors park those pesky RVs?

Robert Frost wrote, "Good fences make good neighbors." Was he writing literally? Was he writing accurately? Recently, my Buena Park neighbor built a second driveway right next to our mutual property line. They didn't do the courteous thing and ask us if we would have a problem with it, or if we had specific suggestions. No, they just built it.

As soon as our neighbor started digging up the yard, I knew what was coming: They were planning to park their RV up against our property. I quickly made a call to the Buena Park Code Enforcement. There wasn't much I could do until they poured the concrete. So I waited.

Here it comes

Weeks later, the concrete was poured. But it went a bit too far onto city property, so a city inspector had my neighbor hammer out

a small section that would have been an illegal driveway. Unfortunately, that didn't stop the overall plan. And just as I had predicted, the RV soon rolled in.

Suddenly, our view of the neighborhood was blocked by a large, metal wall. We felt boxed in; the only view lay straight ahead. We were like horses with blinders. To make matters worse, my neighbor would walk over my fenced area onto my lawn to check the connections and to see if the RV was backed in enough. We felt violated.

What's the rule?

I needed to know what the fence-height regulations were in Buena Park. Code Enforcement stated that a block fence between two neighbors in the front yard can't be any higher than 2 feet. But for some reason, parking an RV is legal. What logic . . . a 10-foot fence is illegal but a 10-foot RV is perfectly acceptable?

We asked Code Enforcement departments in other cities about regulations involving RV parking. Here are their comments.

Anaheim Community Preservation

Q: Is RV parking a common problem in Anaheim?

A: There is a 72-hour parking regulation for the street. Vehicles need to be operable and not parked on the lawn, but on a hard surface.

Q: Have neighbors ever gone to court because of an RV issue?

A: They come to court with other problems, such as garbage issues, and then the RV situation is brought up.

Newport Beach Code Enforcement

Q: Are RVs a common problem in Newport Beach?

A: A 22-foot RV has 24 hours to load or off-load. Owners can keep them in their driveways, but they have to have garage access. Side yards have to be free and clear.

Q: Have neighbors ever gone to court because of an RV issue?

A: No. We go out to mediate the problem with the people.

El Cajon Community Development

Q: Are RVs a common problem in El Cajon?

A: We have not quantified it, but yes, we have had complaints on the issue. There is the 72-hour parking regulation, like many cities have. RVs are like toys. They are fun to have, but people don't want to find the proper storage for them.

Q: Have neighbors ever gone to court because of an RV issue?

A: Not sure, but we had a situation that was brought up that 50% liked them and 50% didn't.

Q: What was the outcome?

A: The situation was left as is, and now we have the issue of RVs parked in driveways that are hanging over the public right-of-way and blocking neighbors' views.

Code Enforcement had no answers. They said RVs are acceptable as long as they are sitting on a pad and not on grass. (Of course, each city has its own rules.)

It gets uglier

Soon, our neighbors were cutting away a patio cover to better accommodate the RV. Now this monstrosity is backed up to the edge of their house and access to their side yard is blocked.

To keep a better eye on their prized possession, our neighbors then installed five video surveillance cameras. One camera on the side of his house surveys our front yard – a real invasion of privacy.

"I would knock on his door and explain the situation and ask him to move it. If he didn't move it, I would take pictures where it was parked and also one of the view from my window which is now blocked. I would write him a letter and include these pictures. If he decided not to move it, I would call the police and let them settle it."

...Mary Jo McDonald, La Mesa

"I would advise the city by phone and in writing, describing the impact on my family life and degradation of my property values in the immediate neighborhood, with the impact on my children and their activities with their friends in the front yard."

...Frank Meyers, El Cajon

"Ask neighbor to move the RV. Complain about the RV in view. Call city about RVs in residential area. Pass out petitions. Buy two large dogs and have them bark all night."

We asked them to move that particular camera and they promised they would. But it hasn't happened yet.

The camera above their garage is pointed directly at the RV. But when they move the RV, my whole front yard comes into the camera's view, which means my family is being videotaped coming and going. The police officer I spoke with said sure, it's rude and inconsiderate. But unless it's pointing directly into a window, there's no violation.

We hit a brick wall

We complained many times to Code Enforcement, but to no avail. After realizing that my grievances had reached a stalemate, I wanted to know what rights I have as property owner. Sadly, I discovered, none at the moment.

Apparently, there had been a similar issue brought to council members in March 2004 and September 2004. The controversy surrounded RVs that were being parked in the streets where it was difficult to see around them. It was decided that parking RVs on driveways is acceptable, as long as there is adequate space.


So RV owners, like our neighbors, are now expanding their driveways or adding a parking pad. The catch, though, is that frontyard landscaping can't be less than 30% of the overall space.

Buena Park council members need to realize there isn't enough room for these monstrosities in our neighborhoods. People take pride in their homes and invest a lot of money in upgrades to increase their home's potential value. Parking a huge RV in the front yard is not

only an eyesore, it diminishes the overall value of the neighborhood.

We can't fight City Hall, but my husband and I have come up with our own solution: We planted a 10-foot tree next to the property line to obscure the video surveillance camera and to block our neighbors' unsightly RV. And we've planted bushes along the fence to keep this neighbor out of our yard. It's working temporarily. But hopefully, the city of Buena Park will find the need to change their ordinance on RV storage in the immediate future.

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

Dear Councilman Nowatka,

We have been residents of Torrance on Newton Street for 43 years. RVing has always been a very important part of our lifestyle. It would be a hardship to us and our friends not to be able to occasionally park on the Torrance city streets.

We are opposed to any ordinance restricting RV parking.

We understand that some people have experienced problems due to inconsiderate RV owners. We believe that our current traffic ordinance limiting parking for 72 hours only needs to be enforced to eliminate the problems that some of these people are having. I know some have said that the current ordinance cannot be enforced. Some have said that people just move their vehicles (not only RVs but cars also) a couple of feet to avoid a ticket. Wouldn't it be much simpler to modify the current ordinance to require that when a vehicle is sitting over 72 hours that it must be moved a significant distance from it's current parking space? This would be easy to enforce and deter those people who are using the street for their long-term parking places. From time to time any RV'er needs to park on the street in front of their property. It is clear that everyone understands that. The current limit of 72 hours should be more than sufficient for anyone.

Creating a new ordinance with new permits, paperwork, tracking, enforcement - should it be possible to enforce - seems to be unrealistic and an undue burden on city residents and city officials.

Please don't penalize the majority of the RV owner community because of the actions of a few inconsiderate RV owners. Enforce the existing laws on those inconsiderate people.

Dear Torrance Representatives,

This letter is in regards to the RV parking issue. As a person who grew up in a family where we used a RV extensively, and as a previous owner, I think I have a balanced opinion in regards to the ongoing problems.

When we owned our motorhome, we parked it in our side *driveway* we were fortunate to have plenty of room for our RV. As a matter of fact, we *wouldn't have bought the thing* had we not had that parking, because we considered street parking inconsiderate. What surprises me is how some people have no qualms parking something as large as a *shipping container* in front of their neighbor's home, completely obliterating any view of the street or anything beyond the curb.

The biggest issue, that I see, is that motorhomes are growing in size and girth (not unlike americans in general!) In the past, most were simply small campers and mini trailers. Now, they are huge buses that rival the size of some homes! *It is no more appropriate to park a trailer/fabricated home on the street than a giant 40 foot travel trailer.* Are Torrance streets *CEtrailer parks!*? It's NOT reasonable to have something as large as second home parked on the street for any length of time. What's the difference between a giant bus-sized motorhome, and a semi-truck? You can't park a semi-truck in the neighborhood, that's what.

Electrical cords used to recharge batteries are often strung across sidewalks creating tripping hazards these are often left for days, while they do their job is this any wiser than leaving your hose flopped across the sidewalk, ignored and forgotten? The extra wide girth prevents safe access to neighborhood streets for children and pedestrians, and narrows the street to the point that cars have difficulty passing one another. And, try to back out of your driveway with a n eight-foot wide RV parked in adjacent to your yard it's precarious at best. Do some SUV rival the size of some trailers? Yes, but you can fit an SUV in a typical driveway.

Motorhomes can exceed the cost of a home! Storing them in a off site storage facility must be considered with the cost of owning an item like that, much like paying for gas, camp sites , timeshares, or any other form of upkeep. If you can't afford that, maybe you shouldn't have purchased it to begin with. Or, perhaps you need to consider downsizing your purchase.

My opinion:

1. no long term parking in the street, or severely limited parking, particularly if the vehicle exceeds a certain length and/or width. Short term , for loading and unloading is necessary.

2. The streets should NOT be used for long-term storage of any vehicle, trailer, hitch or boat. *Nothing that isn't a functioning licensed motor vehicle should be parked at all in the street* whether attached to a vehicle or not - that would get trailers, boats, hitches and the like off our streets, and into storage, where they belong.

3. If RV parking, curbside, is allowed, vehicles of any size, but particularly vehicles of excessive width, shouldn't be parked within 15 20 feet of a corner/intersection.

4. If RV parking, curbside, is allowed, there needs to be clearance of a safe and reasonable length by driveways. In addition, vehicles shouldn't be parked on lawns or unpaved portions of the yard.

I will be looking to see how each representatives votes on this issue.

We have many problems in our neighborhood with the parking of motor homes and trailers. We had a problem with a neighbor who had a trailer approximately 30' attached to their full size truck. They would park it in front of their house, then park one vehicle in the driveway, and one vehicle in front of their next door neighbors house. With enough complaints to the city and him not following the 72 hour rule, he finally got it towed away (truck & trailer).

We have a next door neighbor, who's son has an old motor home, which he parks in front of her home (the son does not live there). He works for the city, knows the parking enforcement officer, and knows how to keep from getting towed. The neighbor next door to them has called many times and complained about the view obstruction when they pull in and out of their driveway. The safety factor should always be considered. That motor home was just moved a few feet every few days and never has been towed away. The neighbors finally gave up.

On our block alone, we have three homes with 5 vehicles. The rest of the homeowners have no less than 2 to 3 cars each. If we had more motor homes or trailers on our block, there would be no parking for the homeowners or their guests. Parking is already a problem.

When people purchase an oversized vehicle they should rent a storage space. Not inconvenience their neighbors. Not make their neighborhood look bad. Think of the safety issues, and be considerate of others. Unfortunately, there are those who like making their own rules. It should not matter who you are or who you know.

I would like to talk this opportunity to voice my opinion regarding the issued related to the on-street parking of oversized vehicles. As I indicated previously I am not in favor of introducing a new ordinance and restricting on-street parking. The current laws prohibit parking in excess of 72 hrs at one location without moving the vehicle (oversized on not).

In my particular situation I live directly across the street from the front entrance of Hickory Elementary School, and during business hours on any given school day all available parking is taken by TUSD staff because there is inadequate parking for the employees. This forces the employees to park on the street. I do not mention this as a complaint, even if I personally feel they need to correct the problem. I only mention this because for a majority of the time a vehicle of one form or another will be parked on the street in front of and on the side of my corner lot a majority of the time. I am limited to where I can park any of my vehicles (boat trailer or personal everyday cars) because my driveway is two short to park in legally and it is not a legal driveway for today's requirements. I keep my vehicles moved from the front to the side of my lot on a regular basis and keep the roadway clean and free of debris on a daily basis. I do not keep my boat trailer at my residence all year, but only during the season. I have inquired about local storage; however it is limited to not available and not cost efficient.

In addition a coupe times a year (one to three) I have out of area relatives and in-laws travel to visit the family who stay with us in the house but park their vehicles in front of my house. They two are moved on a regular basis and I make sure they are not parked in any manner to create a hazard.

I could go on given several other reasons why I am not supportive of changing or adding any ordinances but I feel you have heard my opinion.

I do however understand and feel some of the complaints are legitimate. I feel these incidents can be corrected and resolved with the currents laws we have.

First, I do wish to thank you for the care and concern that you have exhibited through-out the tedious processes involved in the "On-street Parking of Oversized Vehicle Ordinance" proposal. How difficult it must be to attempt to satisfy everyone who feels that have a "stake" in your final decision/Ordinance.

The Public Hearings, in which I was privileged to attend, do appear that:

- The proposal to "Grandfather" current vehicles owned does seem the fairest, most impartial manner to address this difficult issue. When a part of the Municipal Code was rewritten, requiring homes to have two garages and a driveway to have parking for two vehicles, my home was exempt under a "Grandfather" Clause, and still is exempt;
- Existing parking regulation(s) enforcement, would resolve 99% of the complaints;
- A "Grandfather" ordinance would have **no** punitive effect on existing vehicle owners, nor a tragic fiscal impact upon Senior and Low-Income Torrance residents; while reducing the number of oversized vehicles, parked on the street, over time.

Unless the property tax laws have changed, it is my understanding that I am paying taxes out into the middle of the street. That does cover a portion of where my RV is parked, for 72 hours at a time.

Current Municipal Codes cover most of the concerns of opponents of "On-street Parking, such as: Parking on narrow streets; close to intersections/driveways, allowing signage to be posted limiting/prohibiting same; living in those vehicles; etc., etc.. About all has been covered in previous Public Hearings and covered in the draft proposal/Ordinance.

Yes, I am an owner of an oversized vehicle, albeit only twenty-two (22) foot in length. My RV is well-maintained, in excellent running condition, and I do adhere to current on-street parking regulations. Retirement has been enhanced by the ability to travel at leisure, after taking as much

time I wish for loading/unloading. Storage facilities, in close proximity to my residence, are either FULL or priced well outside the budget of this retired, low income Senior.

The alternative would be for me to sell my home and move out of the area which has been kind, gracious and good to me, my deceased companion and life-long friend. IF I were forced to sell, where would I go that could offer the protection and convenience of our City of Torrance? That takes me back to possible punitive action, punishing the masses for the desires of a few.

Your time and consideration is greatly appreciated for seriously considering "Grandfather" -ing the oversized vehicles now owned by current Torrance residents.



re: The proposed ordinance for on street parking for Oversized/Trailers/Recreational Vehicles

Parking on the street by oversized vehicles, trailers and recreational vehicles has become a safety issue in our city. "Grandfathering in" current RVs/Trailers and wide vehicles allows the vehicles that are stored on the streets to continue to do so. These are the vehicles that caused the need for ordinance in the first place and so they will probably continue to abuse their parking privileges in the city.

Torrance's traffic has increased dramatically compared to when the city and streets were first developed. Many streets are too narrow to allow two cars to pass by safely at the same time if there is an oversized vehicle or wide trailer parked on the street. One of the reasons for the increase in traffic is due to the elimination of school buses several years ago, yet there are more students in the city than ever before. Many parents must now drive their children to and from school or have their children ride their bicycles to and from school. There are more trash and recycling trucks than when the city started (in fact, there were no recycling trucks at all at the time). All of these have to move over when a wide vehicle is parked on the street.

More and more people are riding their bicycles in an effort to stay healthy or decrease America's dependence on foreign oil. Again, they have to swerve into traffic whenever they pass a wide vehicle parked on the city streets. This is dangerous for both the other car drivers and the bicycle rider.

It is time to update the municipal code to improve the city's safety and to eliminate street parking by these vehicles.

I am an owner of a motorhome and I strongly encourage you to adopt regulations that will result in more effective control of on-street parking of the subject vehicles in Torrance. I recommend the City put forth greater effort to control the parking of the subject vehicles for the following reasons.

1. Our city's liberal parking regulations and lack of enforcement is resulting in non-Torrance residents parking their vehicles within our City's limits.
2. The increase in number of RVs being sold will aggravate existing parking problems (In 1999, some 321,200 new RVs were sold and in 2004 some 364,900 were sold.). According to recent reports, a further increase in RV sales occurred in 2005. (This data was taken from a Good Sam Club report.)
3. City trucks are having difficulty loading trash, etc because of RVs and other vehicles parked on the street at the curb during pick-up days.
4. The parking of such vehicles prohibit sweeping of curbs and gutters on street cleaning days.
5. Safety is compromised. Especially, when such vehicles are often parked near or at street corners and driveways.
6. Parking is at a premium in my area where families once had only two autos. Today, they may have as many as five.
7. Torrance strives to be a beautiful city. The parking of large RVs and other such vehicles doesn't add to this.

In conclusion, Sue Bray, Executive Director of the Good Sam Club that has a membership of more than 900,000 RV owners states, "We do not support permanent parking or storage of any vehicle, not just RVs, on public streets. We do think vehicles should be able to park for a reasonable time, usually up to 72 hours, to give people enough time to load and unload."

My husband and I are not only residents of Torrance but I am also a Realtor with Re/Max. We have lived in Hollywood Riviera on one of the nicest, tree lined streets with million dollar homes. We bought our home in 1999 and there has always been a motor home parked across the street. Our front door and driveway faces Camino Del Campo and this street is well traveled. Not only do people use it as a cut through from PV Drive to PCH, it also leads directly to El Retiro Park and Library and has lots of foot traffic since it leads to the Village.

The neighbor who owes the motor home uses it maybe once every other month, but she moves it either forward or backward every 72 hours to keep from getting a ticket. (Most of the neighborhood has call about this.)

Depending how it's parked, it makes it very difficult for us to get out of our driveway without several turns. Her next door neighbor actually goes out in the street in the morning to make sure his wife can pull onto the street without being hit. The motor home blocks her view of on coming traffic and it also blocks their driveway so the on coming traffic cannot see her.

But this is a person that is not thinking of the neighborhood or their neighbors and does not want to spend the money to park else where. I know this is an issue in a lot of the neighborhoods in Torrance. As a homeowner and a Realtor, I don't appreciate it and I don't think the city should allow it.

I would urge the City to seriously consider not allowing permanent on-street parking.





RV issue is about storage, not parking

The issue (in the recreational vehicle parking ordinance proposed for Torrance) is not RV parking but RV storage. On-street parking is meant for the short term (72 hours by ordinance) and applies to actively used vehicles. The RVs on the street are not being parked; they are being stored. Some even have their non-Torrance friends store their vehicles here since they cannot store them where they live.

The owners do this because 1) it is convenient, 2) it is cheap, 3) they feel it is an entitlement and 4) they disregard the impact to neighbors and traffic.

OPINI

A lot of RV owners do not store their vehicles on the street. They only park on street for short durations to load/unload.

I do not believe grandfathering existing vehicles is a solution. Torrance needs to stop on-street RV storage soon. We need RVs off the street except for short-term parking. The proposed ordinance does an excellent job of listing the ills of RV parking/storage but does little to solve it in the near future.

I believe there may even be a backlash of RV owners, currently storing them off-street, who will start storing them on-street to save money and because of legitimization of RV parking through this proposed ordinance.
